Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

Isaiah describes the pain and insults of the Servant of God. Yet he sounds hopeful when describing God as his help, knowing he will not be disgraced.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11

Paul exults Christ's great sacrifice of humbling himself to become human and die on the cross. He explains that this is why we should now realize the importance of honoring both his name and memory.

Gospel: Mark 14:1-15:47

Mark describes the events leading up to Christ's crucifixion. The Last Supper is described, explaining where the Eucharist began. Judas betrays Jesus and his suffering at the hands of the Sanhedrin (Council) is detailed.

Deacon's Corner

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday. At the beginning of this liturgy, during the blessing of the palms, the Holy Gospel according to St. Mark recounts that Jesus travels to Jerusalem. As He enters the city, "Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches . . . People cried out "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Mark <u>11:1-10</u>) During this Mass, we will also listen to the Lord's Passion which will recount Christ's passion and death.

From Monday through Wednesday of this week, we will celebrate daily Mass. On these days, the Gospel readings of Matthew and John will describe Judas' betrayal of Jesus. On the evening of Holy Thursday, we will begin the Easter Triduum which will conclude with evening prayer on Easter Sunday. During the Triduum, a solemn time in God's Holy Church, the liturgical services that will take place are the Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday of the Lord's Passion, and the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord. Easter Sunday is the Glorious Resurrection of Our Savior and His victory over sin and death. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

During this Holy Week, as disciples of Jesus, we might make time for prayer; go to the sacrament of penance; perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary; forgive someone; pray the Stations of the Cross; help decorate the parish church; or invite a family member or friend to attend the Triduum liturgies.



BABY BOTTLE BLITZ...

Please return your filled Baby Bottles to Church or at the Parish Office (during office hours) on or before this Sunday, March 24th



- DIRECTIONS -

Knead on floured surface, 10 minutes (add more flour if needed). Rub dough ball with vegetable oil & place in oiled bowl. Cover and put in warm place to rise, 1 hour or double in size. Punch dough and cut into 6 equal parts (do not flour surface). Roll each piece into a strip about 15-18" long, place raw, colored egg* in center, bring ends together and twist. Place on flat baking tray. Brush with egg white and dust with colored sprinkles or sugar. Cover and let rise, bake at 350° 20-25 minutes until golden brown.

*Colored eggs - use food coloring dye to color 6 raw in-the-shell eggs. 1 cup warm water, 1 tbsp. white vinegar, 5-6 drops food color. Egg will cook while bread bakes.
